

DeVriendt Captures Global Manitoba Open Title

Doug DeVriendt defeated Evan Mancer 6-1, 6-0 to earn the Men's Singles Championship at the 2004 Global Manitoba Open and a cheque in the amount of \$2,000. It was the 4th Manitoba Open Singles title for DeVriendt, who was victorious in 1999, 2002 and 2003. He displayed his dominance of the local tennis scene once again, not dropping a single set in the entire tournament and losing only six games in his four matches.

Alia Kalicinsky secured her first Manitoba Open title with a hard fought 7-5, 2-6, 6-4 victory over Alexa Zayac in the Women's Singles final. This came on the heels of a grueling three set victory over Misa Simonova in the semi-final on Saturday, which Alia won 6-4, 3-6, 7-6(6) in 2 hours and 59 minutes. The icing on the cake was teaming up with her sister, Eva, to win the Women's Doubles crown with a 6-3, 6-2 win over Hiroko Kumagai and Agatha Yong.

Eva Kalicinsky was also a double winner, as a result of capturing the Mixed Doubles Championship with her partner, Geoff Kirbyson. Unfortunately, the final match was not played due to injuries to both Sean LaCap and Kyla McNicol.

It what was probably the most exciting match of the entire tournament, Sean LaCap and Julian Seelan defeated the number one seeds, Doug DeVriendt and Evan Mancer, in straight sets to take the Men's Doubles Championship. The teenagers served well and returned well in the 7-5, 6-2 win and earned full marks for the decisive victory. It was a very satisfying victory for LaCap and Seelan, given that they both were forced to retire from their singles matches on Saturday afternoon due to leg cramps caused by the severe heat.

President's Message

In keeping with my belief that Tennis Manitoba should do more to keep our members aware of what we are doing, I would like to share with you my experience at this year's Tennis Canada Annual Meetings, which were held in



Toronto over the weekend of July 24th to July 26th to coincide with the opening of the new Rexall Centre.

In order to watch as much tennis as possible on Saturday, I flew out on the Saturday morning "red eye", which departed Winnipeg at 6:50am. I had lots of company though - Rick and his wife Kim and a number of players going to U12 Junior Nationals were also on the flight. Transportation from the airport to the hotel had been arranged and when I came out of the "baggage claim" area I saw somebody holding a "Tennis Masters Canada" sign, but assumed that he was waiting for a player. It was only after some scouting around that I decided to go back and then found out that he was actually waiting for us! Rick and Kim were a long way behind me because they had made the mistake of checking-in their luggage.

We were staying at the Schulich Centre on York University campus, about a ten minute walk from the Rexall Centre. When we arrived, we just dropped our things off and headed over to the tennis. Saturday and Sunday are the qualifying rounds, and I always like to watch the Canadian players whenever possible. Unfortunately all four of them lost in the first qualifying round, which meant that there would not be any Canadian players playing on Sunday, the final round of qualifying.

On Saturday evening the Ontario Tennis Association hosted a Welcome Reception and Casual Dinner for the delegates. This was an opportunity for me to say "hello" to many of the people I had met at the Semi-Annual Meeting in February.

Sunday was the main "business" day. The provincial presidents began at 8am with a "Council of Provinces" meeting. We were introduced to Michael Downey, Tennis Canada's new President and CEO, who was chosen after a very thorough search and selection process that involved consultation with all the provincial presidents regarding desirable qualities and experience. Michael replaces Bob Moffat, who has retired after approximately fifteen years at "the helm". Harold Milavsky, the outgoing Chair of the Tennis Canada Board, is very enthusiastic about our new CEO and I could see why. Two of the key messages that Michael shared about the direction in which he will be taking us were "revenue generation" and "integration". He believes that there are many fundraising opportunities that we must explore much more aggressively, and that we (the provinces and Tennis Canada) should be looking for ways to work more

closely together. We had a valuable and informative discussion and everybody felt that the one hour allocated to this meeting, which extended to an hour and a half and made us late for the AGM, was insufficient and should be extended next year.

The AGM itself was over relatively quickly and was not very exciting. The most interesting aspect for us was that Bob Akman was elected to the Tennis Canada Board. Bob will serve four years as the Board member resident in the Prairie Region. I am looking forward to working with Bob to help move tennis in this province (and indeed in the Prairie Region) forward.

After lunch, there was a National / Provincial staff meeting, which included Tennis Canada staff members and all the Provincial Presidents and Executive Directors. Jack Graham, the new Chair of the Tennis Canada Board, talked about Tennis Canada's newly adopted 2004-2008 Strategic Plan and there was significant discussion regarding a national (are you thinking "integration"?!) grassroots programme for tennis. We ended with a half hour workshop where we thought about how we would "all like to work together" (Tennis Canada and the Provincial Associations) in the areas of: partnership; promotions (of the game); research and development; and planning and accountability.

Tennis Manitoba is currently in the process of developing its own 2004-2008 Strategic Plan, as are a number of the other provinces, and of course it would not make sense for us to be planning to go in a different direction from Tennis Canada (did somebody say "integration"?).

Overall, I felt that Tennis Canada did an excellent job of making the meetings valuable to the provincial delegates, and also of tapping the expertise of these delegates. One of the key things that jumped out at me was that we didn't go all that way just for a boring old AGM - there was very real value in the journey. This is a lesson that Tennis Manitoba will certainly be looking at when we are planning our AGM this year.

Monday was just a "fun" day for me. There were National / Provincial staff meetings in the morning, but Rick is our staff member and since I was not invited I did not have any great desire to gate crash. Instead, I took the opportunity to watch some of the first round matches during the day. Again, the Canadian players did not fare very well (they both lost), but I can't help feeling optimistic about our future. Monday evening was the Rexall Centre Grand Opening Reception and Ceremonies and we had great seats for the inaugural Night Session, which began with Agassi vs. Haas, an electric three setter that did full justice to the occasion. Agassi won, and although he lost his next match he had already initiated the excitement that would lead to a record attendance and the beginnings of the financial foundation upon which Tennis Canada's new strategic plan is built.

In a 15 minute span on Saturday afternoon, Sean LaCap and Julian Seelan went down with leg cramps and Kyla McNicol sprained her knee.

Robin sprinted to the rescue, attending to LaCap as he lay in pain on court 6. After helping to get LaCap back to the clubhouse, Robin provided treatment and strongly encouraged him to consume liquids. At this point, Robin was called out to court 1, where Julian Seelan was confined to his chair and unable to stand up to play the third set of his semi-final match with Evan Mancer. While treating Seelan for leg cramps, Robin was quickly called over to court 2, where Kyla McNicol laid on the court in obvious pain. He spent several minutes attending to Kyla and she was actually able to continue her match for a short time before having to retire with a severe knee sprain.

Provinces Unite to Revive Prairie Regionals

After a lengthy absence, the Prairie Regionals returned to Manitoba and Saskatchewan this summer, after the two provinces agreed to bring back the Junior National Qualifiers for the U12, U14, U16 and U18 age groups. The feeling among both provinces was that the Prairie Regionals would provide an additional competitive opportunity for our athletes and be a stepping stone to the Junior Nationals, where the level of competition is quite high.

In order to qualify for the Prairie Regionals, athletes from Manitoba had to finish in the top four spots in the rankings, based on results of the four Provincial tournaments held in May and June: the Tuxedo Junior Open, the Wheat City Junior Open, the Manitoba Junior Open and the Head Junior Classic. Tennis Ontario Brings Back the U12 Junior Nationals

Tennis Ontario thought it was time to revive the U12 Junior Nationals and the association took the lead role on organizing the event that was recently held at the St.Catharines Racquets Club. It was the first U12 Nationals in more than 15 years and it was very well received by the players, parents and coaches from across Canada. Tournament Director David Defehr and Tournament Chairperson Lezlie Murch can take great pride in the event, which according to Manitoba coach Peter Otto "was the best Junior Nationals that I have been to as a coach."

The format was unique, as compared to other Junior Nationals, with the 32 boys and 32 girls being placed into 8 pools of 4 players each. Every player was guaranteed 4 singles matches and a Futures Cup team competition was also held to give the players some doubles matches. The top player from each of the pools entered the Championship Flight, to fight for the title of Junior National Champion. The only Manitoban to win his pool was 10 year old Chad LaCap, with a perfect 3-0 record. He then drew the eventual champion from Quebec in the quarter-finals, losing 6-3, 6-0. A great result nonetheless for someone who will be back next year looking to grasp the championship trophy.

Erika Fridrik managed to earn a third place finish in her pool which placed her in Flight # 3, while the rest of the Manitoba team, including Jade Kirstein, Katy Lesiuk, Brendan Corrigan, Muzeen Ismath and Daniel Breslauer, were relegated to Flight # 4 after round-robin play. Daniel earned two victories before dropping the final match in Flight # 4

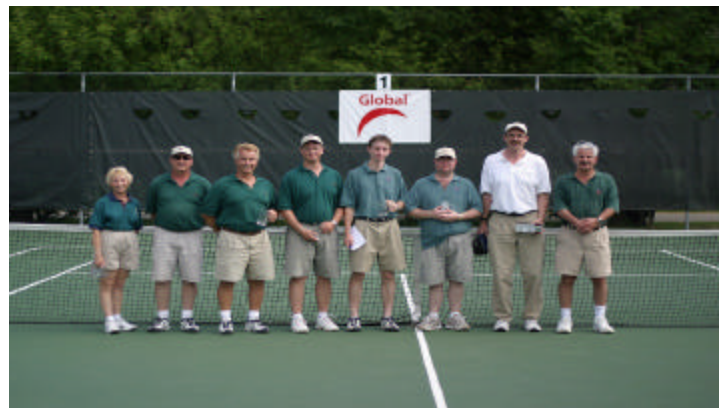
